AGM Sailing Committee Report 22/23 Season

Club Racing/Sailing Programme:

- Most races were made up of the usual core of racing sailors in our fleet similar to last season.
- New racers included Ben, Shelly, Jaxon, Lisa, Brian, Lena, Nick & Angel, Steve, Sam and Axel... Hopefully I haven't forgotten anyone?
- If we actually had everyone out racing and having fun together our racing fleet sizes would be around 26 yachts which is a very healthy fleet size for a club with our membership base. To add to this, we could add some from green fleet progression and also some from the Development Squad and we could be nudging fleet sizes of over 30! What we need to do is work out how we can get you all wanting to be racing together having fun at the same time.
- The weather again was a frustrating feature, weather systems were lining up with our
 weekends while the weekdays were gorgeous. The third La Nina in a row made for a testing
 not very summery season. The coming season has a forecast for a very strong El Nino so it
 will be interesting to see the differences in our weather conditions for the season and it
 could get quite hot.
- CANCELLATIONS OF RACING: We had a couple of cancellations to racing because of duty members/sailors not turning up and we had a few early cancellations because the weather was unsafe for racing. Where possible we will continue to cancel racing as early as possible when conditions are unsafe for our racing fleet and our patrol boat crews.
- I'd like to make a point on the weather. I see there's a trend for people to check the weather the night before on the various weather apps. I have no problem with this as I'm a weather geek and I check it regularly however, please don't make your mind up the night before that you're not going to sail or come to the club the following day. Firstly, weather predictions are consistently so far off and many days were defiantly sailable and those that did turn up really enjoyed the day. Secondly, we've been working really hard at providing a day's entertainment whether we are racing is on or not. Activities like wingfoiling, snorkelling, sea biscuit or even just hanging out messing around with boats etc.
- If you have any ideas on what you think would make our club racing more engaging for more members, please hit me up on email.
- SOCIAL AND MIDWEEK SAILING continued to be strong and growing in participation, we now have a WhatsApp group for this to improve members interactions and safety. Please use the QR Code downstairs at the whiteboard to join the group. This is for everyone if you're intending to swim, kayak or sail.

Events:

- We successfully hosted the Mosquito State Titles over the March long weekend, we had 3
 days of perfect flatwater offshore breeze ranging from 6kts to 22kts providing the fleet with a
 broad range of racing conditions. I'd like to make a special mention to Kai and Mikayla and
 Chris and Declan for representing our club on behalf of our junior sailors from our large
 Mosquito fleet. Kai and Mikayla completed every race and showed great resilience for their
 first ever State Championships. Well done!
- I want to mention how appreciative I am of the race management team we had for this event. The call went out for volunteers and roles were filled immediately. The product we put on the water was all class. It was the first time I have run an event like this and you all

made it such a pleasure and a very rewarding experience both for myself and the fleet. It's a hard job to make me look good but your dedication to the event and to this club had me sparkling.

- I sought constructive criticism in the weeks following the event from competitors and for them to be honest, the response was overwhelmingly positive across the board. So again congratulations and thankyou to all the volunteers. A job very well done.
- So successful was this event the Mosquito Association returned to our club over the Anzac weekend to dovetail their Sloop State Championships into our programmed racing and while unfortunately I wasn't available for this weekend the reports I received were again all glowing. Congratulations to Rob Mott and Maddie Sheard for winning this State Championship. Again another junior from our club in her first State Championship and taking the win. How good! Well done to our boat crews again for their great work.
- I want everyone to take note here, the Mosquito Association members invited juniors to
 come racing with them on their boats for this event. Many came from a long way away to
 support juniors, especially ours. Even now the association is supporting a couple of our
 juniors with improved platforms and rigging, helping to get kids on the water. These efforts
 should be acknowledged, supported and celebrated.
- I can officially announce today that the Rye Vs Rosebud race will now be called the "Capel Sound Invitational" or affectionately known as the "Battle for the bar" referring to both the waters we sail in and the sand bar of which we race along. This is a partnership between Rye and Rosebud Yacht Clubs. The concept for this event is to embrace and participate against each other like a football or cricket club would and then enjoy the comradery between the two clubs in a gathering during the evening to celebrate each clubs achievement's from the day. Next season we are looking at getting together for a beer or two and a feed with presentation at Escape Brewery, thanks Russ. Another focus for this event into the future is to increase active sailing members for both clubs. Like a two for one deal, the friendships you make at one club automatically transfers to the other building a larger more diverse community. The race will stay as a reaching race and there will be a 3-4 day window between Xmas and the New Year to try and achieve the best and most fun sailing conditions for competitors. I urge all of you to get on board with this as they won the first event by 22 seconds. Rosebud YC have very kindly donated a perpetual trophy and some medallions for those that competed on the day.
- We now have the RYC Speed Challenge. If you're not involved in this...get on board! We
 are including more cash prizes as time goes on. Seek myself or Karl out if you need some
 help to get involved in this. We have a leader board with 13 competitors already, there's still
 time to improve upon these results and at the moment Elandra is beating me in her minnow
 so I need to get busy too and shake this up. Take that as a warning to all above me, I'm
 coming for you!
- We had Wayne Bates visit and generously gave our Sabre members half a day's coaching and boat setup tips. From all accounts this was very well received and I noticed a large increase in tinkering and boat improvements in the following weeks. We'll line Wayne up again hopefully for an early and mid-season session during the coming season. This may include a small donation from members involved for his valuable time.
- The Family Fun Days were more structured this season with Val taking the lead on these.
 It's fair to say that Val took the bit between her teeth and ran with it. Val did a fantastic job
 and a power of work organising some very entertaining days on and off the water. Thank
 you to Karl for assisting Val on these days also. The extra help is always very much
 appreciated.
- Keep an eye out for our up and coming winter camp out in the boat yard. I've floated this idea with a few members and the interest has been really strong. Just because it's not

- sailing season, doesn't mean that we're not a community that can't enjoy our beautiful environment. We have stacks of fun activities lined up for this so watch this space.
- Sailing and wind sports aren't just a sport, it's a way of life, moving forward we'll be focusing
 more on fun and lifestyle aspect of this to further enrich the experience.

Sailing Committee Club Improvements:

- This season we've continued to use My Club Ops and SailorApp, unfortunately with the sad
 passing of Peter Merrit the creator of this race management system, we are currently
 unsure of the future availability of it. We'll work through this over the off season, it may
 continue to operate, if not we'll most likely return to the systems we used previously.
- BuoyZone is continually becoming an integral part of our course laying procedure making courses simple a fast to set and adjust. It's even been used to relocate over a sunken, mislaid mark that we were able to retrieve. Thanks again to Karl for diving on and retrieving this for us.
- While we are on the topic of sunken marks, one came back! I'm not sure how this one was
 lost but a report I had was it was there and ok and then it wasn't. We'll have a look at this
 one when we clean it up and see if we can diagnose what happened so we don't lose
 anymore.
- Our marks now have all new and improved super light ground tackle with better ground holding capabilities. Thanks to Pete, John and Karl for putting these together.
- If I leave anyone out of the thankyous please speak up, I cast my critical eye over all these tasks but I can't do everything so if I miss someone yell out because your help is very import to the club and should be acknowledged.
- I'm also sure you noticed the new deck on your way up here, I'm sure you'll all agree it's a
 marked improvement. Thanks to the Tuesday group of Pete, John, Karl, Mark, David and
 anyone I may have missed.
- Again, thanks to the Tuesday group for the hydraulic tow ball on the front of the tractor making parking the patrols much easier on driver's neck.
- The tractor will also be going in for a full service and a new set of galvanized wheels and a new set of kicks. It's an integral part of our operations and without it we can't operate.
- This winter we are looking at offering a one Sunday a month maintenance program for those that need help with the upkeep of their boats. The expectation is that the club also receives some help catching up on the maintenance that we were unable to do because of the pandemic restrictions. This will be a great opportunity to stay connected with each other over the winter period, have some great times with a bbq and get some jobs done on both your craft and club facilities. - Safety boat trailers and the tractor will be the focus this winter along with general maintenance and improvements to the club house.
- I'm sure many of you noticed on the way in that the front of the club looks a little different? Thank you to Trent Downie a local artist for our fabulous mural. Also, a big thank you to Mick and Ben for getting this organised and delivered. Tasks like these are not easy to navigate so a super effort from all involved. Also thankyou to Pete, John, Mark, Tony and Chris for the remounting of the RYC sign over the door way and the lighting on the mural. Again very much appreciated.

The Boat Yard:

The boat yard is full, we are a victim of our own success here. This is a sailing club, not a storage club. We have potential active members that want to join the club and be involved in the sailing activities we have on offer however we have no capacity to store their boat. So boats in the yard that do not move all season are hindering the growth of the club and the enjoyment of all members. I do urge members that don't intend to sail their boat during the season to please find alternative storage arrangements.

Rosters and Duties:

- I'm not sure if you are all aware but this week the 15 21 May 2023, is National Volunteer Week (NVW). This is an annual event celebrated right across Australia. The week-long event recognises the vital support that the millions of volunteers in our country provide to their communities and encourages people to consider volunteering.

It is your responsibility to ensure storage fees are paid and the club has made its best efforts to find the owners of all the kayaks stored in the yard. There are still approximately 10 kayaks that cannot be accounted for and they will be listed for sale if not removed or storage paid for by the 11th June.

Boat repairs/maintenance starts June 11th

This winter we are looking at offering a one Sunday a month maintenance program for those that need help with the upkeep of their boats. The expectation is that the club also receives some help catching up on the maintenance that we were unable to do because of the lockdowns. This will be a great opportunity to stay connected over the winter period, have some great times with a bbq and get some jobs done on both your craft and club facilities.

This will continue every 2nd Sunday of the month until the season starts or otherwise notified.

Sailing school report

This season saw a return to a full summer program of activities and an increase in participation in many of our Sailing School programs. Our total course enrolments for the summer were 275 with an increase of almost 50 more than last summer. While we did have a number of quite windy days, we were able to keep the OutThere Sailing and Tackers groups on the water almost every day by using alternative activities on several occasions. It seemed that it was a season of either lots of wind (20 knots plus) or sailing in less than 10 knots.

Before the start of the season, Jean and I had several meetings with Sarah Ogilvie and Jaimee Wall from Australian Sailing. The aim was to look at what the Club was doing to retain and increase both membership and on water participation. One of the outcomes from this was to write and publish a Sailing School Handbook to hand out to all participants in Sailing School activities. Another area that we need to continue to focus on is to better follow up with those adults who complete Start Sailing 1 & 2 to keep them involved with Club activities, especially on the water.

Also, before the start of the season I was quite surprised and certainly honoured to receive an invitation to attend an event at Government House to meet the Honourable Linda Dessau, Governor of Victoria. The event was to recognise those who have made a significant contribution as volunteers in community sport.

After having purchased the second RS Quest before the start of the season, we were able to increase the adult participation to 10 in each Start Sailing 1 & 2 group and two of the three groups for the summer were still full. The adult program continues to run with an Instructor or experienced sailor in the boat with the course participants. While it is labour intensive, it does mean that participants learn more quickly and feel safer in the early part of the course in particular. They also get to know several Club members during the program which helps them feel more comfortable at the Club.

An Adult Coaching group was run on Saturday afternoons from 3:00 until 6:00 through part of the season. Those that took part were able to get individual feedback on how they were sailing and how they could improve their skills. We hope to be able to expand this program and involve more people next season. We will contact all participants in recent adult Learn to Sail groups and encourage them to participate in this program or further Australian Sailing courses.

The Tackers program was very successful this summer, with the large number of participants requiring 4 Tackers Instructors to cover the groups safely. Four RHIBs also had to be available just for the Tackers program alone. (For this program Australian Sailing requires one Instructor for 6 participants and one Safety Boat for each 6 boats on the water.) A few of the taller Tackers 3 level participants sailed O'pen BICs during the second eight week block. Hopefully at least six will move into the Development Squad Coaching group for the start of next season and perhaps another eight mid-season. Using the cut down sails and "garbage bag sailing" helped to keep the Tackers groups on the water on windy days for most of their sessions.

The OutThere Sailing program had 22 participants in the first eight week group and 19 in the second. Adding in those who did the three day program in January, we had 53 participants in OutThere Sailing. On one very wet and windy day we did stay off the water for most of the session. By using the sea biscuit and SUPs on light wind days and windSUPs, wing foiling wings on SUPs and surfing on SUPs and kayaks on windy days, we were able to get on the water every week. The variety of activities available has completely changed this program aimed at 12 to 17 year old children and made it much more exciting and engaging. Our numbers in this age group are four times what they had been before, when we were running Start Sailing 1 and 2 for them.

Junior Development Squad Coaching numbers were down a little, but a real step forward was to have 6 participants sailing on catamarans during the season. This certainly changes the dynamics of what happens on the water and provides some added excitement for the young sailors on board. We have also managed to get more people into their own boats this summer than we have previously.

We were one of four Clubs in Australia piloting new Wing Foiling programs for Australian Sailing and providing feedback to them. There are three aspects of the program, a FoilLAB – learning how to get the board up on the foils when being towed behind a powerboat, Learn to Wing – learning how to use the wing effectively on a displacement board like a SUP or windsurfing board and Learning to Wing Foil – putting the two aspect together to foil with the wing on the foiling board. We have had more than 20 people involved in these activities with several now effectively wing foiling. This is a great activity with winds from 15 to 30 knots.

We have run three Powerboat Courses during the season with 14 more people getting Powerboat licences. During this course the participants have practical on water tuition on how to drive a powerboat in a variety of situations.

The Schools' Programs for this summer were the Rye Primary School 5 day program, a two day program for the Little Yarra Steiner School and a half day session for a group of girls from PLC. The Rye PS program involves Sailing, Stand Up Paddle Boarding and Kayaking and had 48 participants. The Steiner School group involved 26 students in two five hour sessions. The PLC group was 18 Year 10 girls on a day of 25 knots and we ran both Learn to Wing and windsurfing activities for them.

It was unfortunate that the King Valley School's group were forced to cancel their Sailing Camp due to government changes in payments to teachers involved in "out of normal hours" activities. It would have cost them an extra \$4,500 to run the camp and this was not practical.



One last thing on sailing activities is to include that Kai Robertson sailed in the Mosquito spinnaker class Victorian Championships with Mikayla Erikson as crew and Chris Campbell also sailed with Declan Styant-Browne as crew. Both boats' crews were given encouragement awards and Mikayla won an award for the best placed female sailor in the event. Madi Sheard, Henry Miller-Heinze and Jaxon Caravias were able to crew on boats sailing in the Mosqiuto Sloop Victorian titles, Madi. crewing with Rob Lott, won the State Title in that event. In a different event, Chris Campbell crewing for Jeremy Brooks won F18 Catamaran the Victorian Championship. Elandra Paton Jones took her Minnow to the Victorian Youth Championship 3 day Coaching event at Sorrento. It is great to see some of our young sailors doing well with their sailing outside normal Club events. .

Financially the Sailing School is doing quite well. The two major purchases for the season were the RS Quest and the unexpected replacement of the motor on Northerly. The first half of the cost of the Quest was paid in this financial year while the second half has now been paid in April to be included in next year's figures. Northerly had been taken to Nautical Marine to resolve some issues with the motor and because of both the damage to the motor and the lack of parts available to repair it we decided it was prudent to put a new Mercury 50hp four stroke motor on the boat. These items are shown in the figures as capital expenditure.

Our income for the year was \$39,027.69 and our surplus for the year was \$1,595.24. We are hugely grateful for the \$5,000 sponsorship from the Bendigo Bank as the Major Sponsor of our Junior Sailing Program. The bank has supported our Junior Sailing Program for more than 10 years now and this has been an enormous benefit to our Sailing School.

We also received \$1,250.00 in donations which enabled the Sailing School to buy wet suits and life jackets; as well helping those sailors needing financial help to purchase boat parts,

Finally, I want to thank all of the Instructors, Coaches and other helpers who have helped to make the summer program so successful. I will make specific mention of Jean, who, in addition to being the Sailing School Treasurer, runs the canteen on most Saturdays, making lunches for up to 20 people each day. She also catered for the three Day OutThere Experience program with lunches for up to 18 people and the catering for up to 16 people helping run the Rye Primary School Sailing Program. I want to also give special thanks to Peter Kinsman for always being there when help is needed.
