

We recently hosted for the second time the Mosquito MKII Class Vic State Championships. The MKII is a sloop rig so it runs a main and jib with a helm and crew that both utilise the trapeze. This configuration allows the association to introduce more people to the class and particularly junior sailors wanting to further their experience in sailing with limited responsibility. It's a lot of fun for junior sailors to sail fast and learn to trapeze under the guidance of an experienced skipper.

We are exploring the option with the association to run this event as an annual feature on our calendar as it is the perfect way to progress juniors from the Sailing School out onto the course proper and further develop their sailing journey. Last year we had a fleet of 7 racing as a trial while this year we improved on this with a fleet of 11. There's no reason this cannot grow into something quite significant into the future and I expect other classes that can do so, follow in the footsteps of RYC and the Mosquito class.

Most of the catamarans came from far and wide, we should acknowledge their commitment to the sport but as we have one of the largest fleets in Australia I really want to thank those from RYC who participated in the event and those that provided a boat for it. Well done and I hope all of the junior sailors had a great time!

Sailing school report

Hi all,

As of last weekend, most of our Sailing School programs for the current season have now been completed. I will be running a Powerboat Handling Course in the next couple of weeks. This course covers the information you need to know to do your licence test and also provides some on the water boat driving exercises to help build up your skills. I will be circulating dates for this in the next few days. If I cannot fit everyone into this course, I plan to run several more in September.

The sailing over the past couple of months has been quite good with light winds most of the time. However, the second last session with the Sunday morning Development squad was really quite challenging. The wind was around 18 knots from the north-west creating some decent sized waves. We decided we would send the squad out on the water anyway although we did keep them a bit closer to shore than usual. Three of the young sailors, Banjo, Josh and Pippa who had just recently moved from sailing OpenBICs to sailing Laser 4.7s only a couple of weeks before, had a great time although there were a few capsizes. Alex, who had been sailing a Minnow until the previous week also sailed in Laser 4.7 for the first time. He had to deal with a broken tiller extension universal joint before he sailed back to shore. A couple of younger sailors, Tom in a Minnow and Jayla in a BIC sailed as well and enjoyed themselves. It was certainly the strongest wind and biggest waves they had ever sailed in.

We found the weather forecasts quite consistent in their inaccuracy. The last Saturday for the adult group had been sailing comfortably in 12 to 14 knots of wind when a sudden change hit. Luckily they were heading in for lunch when the wind went straight up to 26 knots. Everyone did get back to the beach safely although with a couple of capsizes.

The same day we had the OutThere group in the morning sailing in 10 knots, the Development Squad group windsurfing in 18 to 22 knots close to the beach and for the Wing Foiling group starting at 3:00 the wind had dropped again to about 8 knots. Unfortunately, for the Wing Foilers, every day was quite light – we had been hoping for at least 20 knots on their last day.

Since January, we had run both a Windsurfing course and a Wing Foiling course on Saturday afternoons. These are a bit different from most other learn to sail courses as they prefer stronger wind rather than light. With Windsurfing, it is easy to learn in around 10 knots, but to get the real thrill that Windsurfing provides, 20 knots plus is better. The course was run with wind around 10 knots most days. This is great to get started. We start teaching people with small sails and large big volume boards and everyone is able to sail within the first hour. Skills are improved over time and then sailors can cab choose to sail on smaller boards and use larger sails.

With Wing Foiling courses, there are two separate skills to learn. How to stand on a board being towed behind a power boat and to get it up and foiling is one of these. This takes good balance but is also quite demanding on the boat driver to get the boat speed just right. Learning to sail with the wing on a larger big volume board is the next skill. When transferring this to a board of half the length and much less volume is the next challenge. We now have two foiling boards and wings of 3.1 m, 4m, 5m and 6m. Like Windsurfing, Wing Foilers will choose a sail size to suit the wind strength and the size of the sailor.

Matt Brunton has bought himself a foiling board for Windsurfing. This board is a little bigger than the boards for Wing Foiling and the foil is further back on the board. Boards that are used in the surf without a wing are different again. He took it out on the last session in the Wing Foiling course, but there was not quite enough wind to get the board foiling,

Those of you who watch "Sail GP" or have taken an interest in the America's Cup foiling boats will have an idea how fast foiling craft will go. The foiling catamarans in Sail GP are hitting close to 100 kph at times and things happen very quickly on the race course. Sailing with foils is growing remarkably quickly in many different forms and it is great for us to be involved in this aspect of sailing.

Over the last few weekends we have been running our Presentations for all our Sailing School programs. I would briefly like to thank all our Tackers Instructors and those parents/volunteers who helped with these groups. With the OutThere and Development Squad Programs, again thanks to the Instructors, parents and volunteers from the club for helping with these groups and a special thanks to Lizzie for all her help on Saturday mornings. To the .Adult Sailing group Instructors and volunteers a big thank you as well.

I am writing this on the evening of the weekend that the Mosquito Sloop championships were held. We were able to have six of our young sailors sail with skippers sailing in this event. Sally Naismith sailed on both days, Will Tuchtan and Jensen Peeters sailed on Saturday while Sally, Banjo Elliot-Wilson, Josh Martin and Pippa Hart sailed on Sunday. This opportunity for our young sailors was begun last season and the Mosquito class group have said that they will be back again next summer with the same opportunity offered. Our young sailors loved sailing in this event and all had the opportunity to sail on trapeze in a catamaran going significantly faster than the boats they usually sail in. The skippers involved were very happy with the skills shown by our young sailors.

It has been quite a hectic season again this summer and I am looking at making some changes for next summer. I will have more information about this available shortly.


